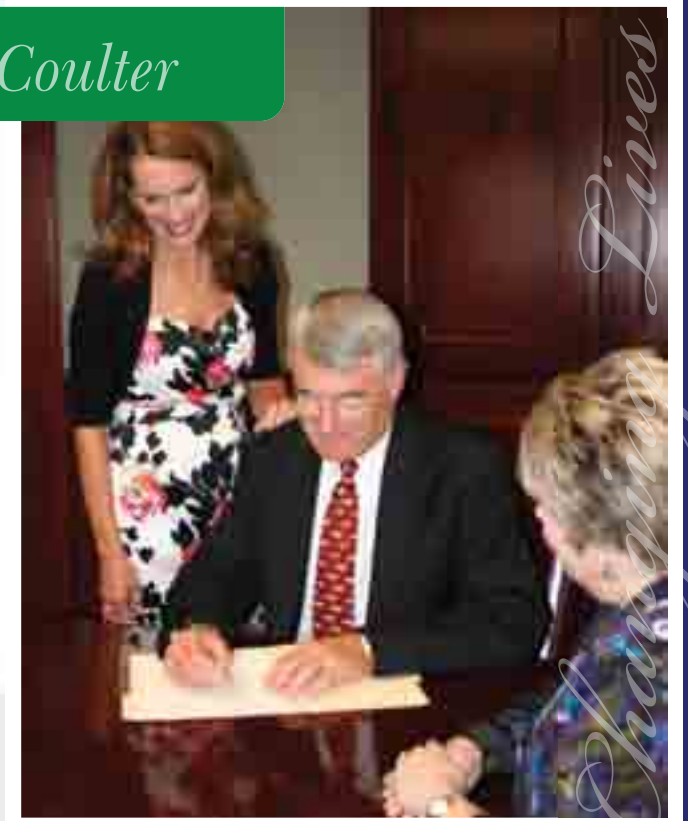
### *"PEP" Squad Volunteers*

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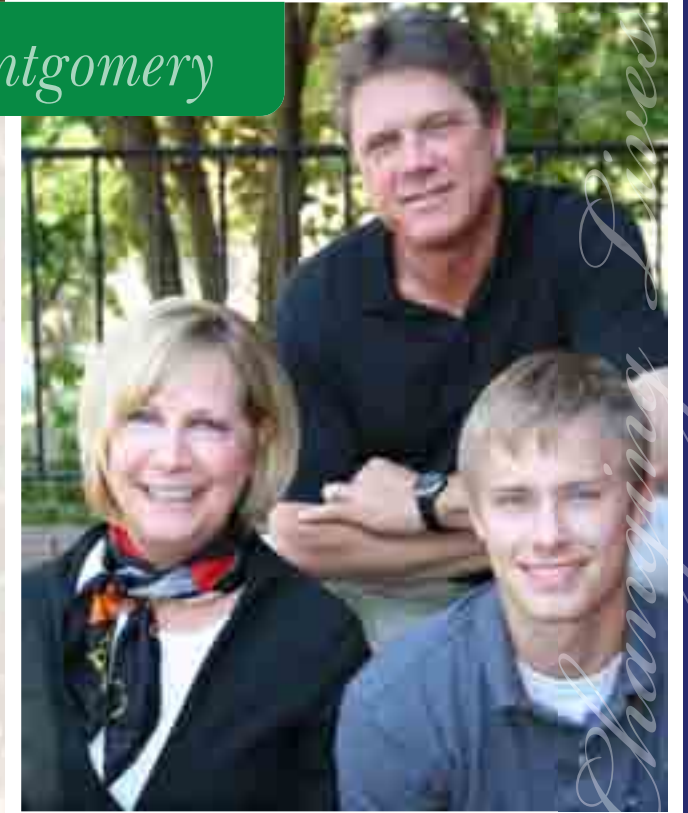
### *Carter's Jewel Chest*

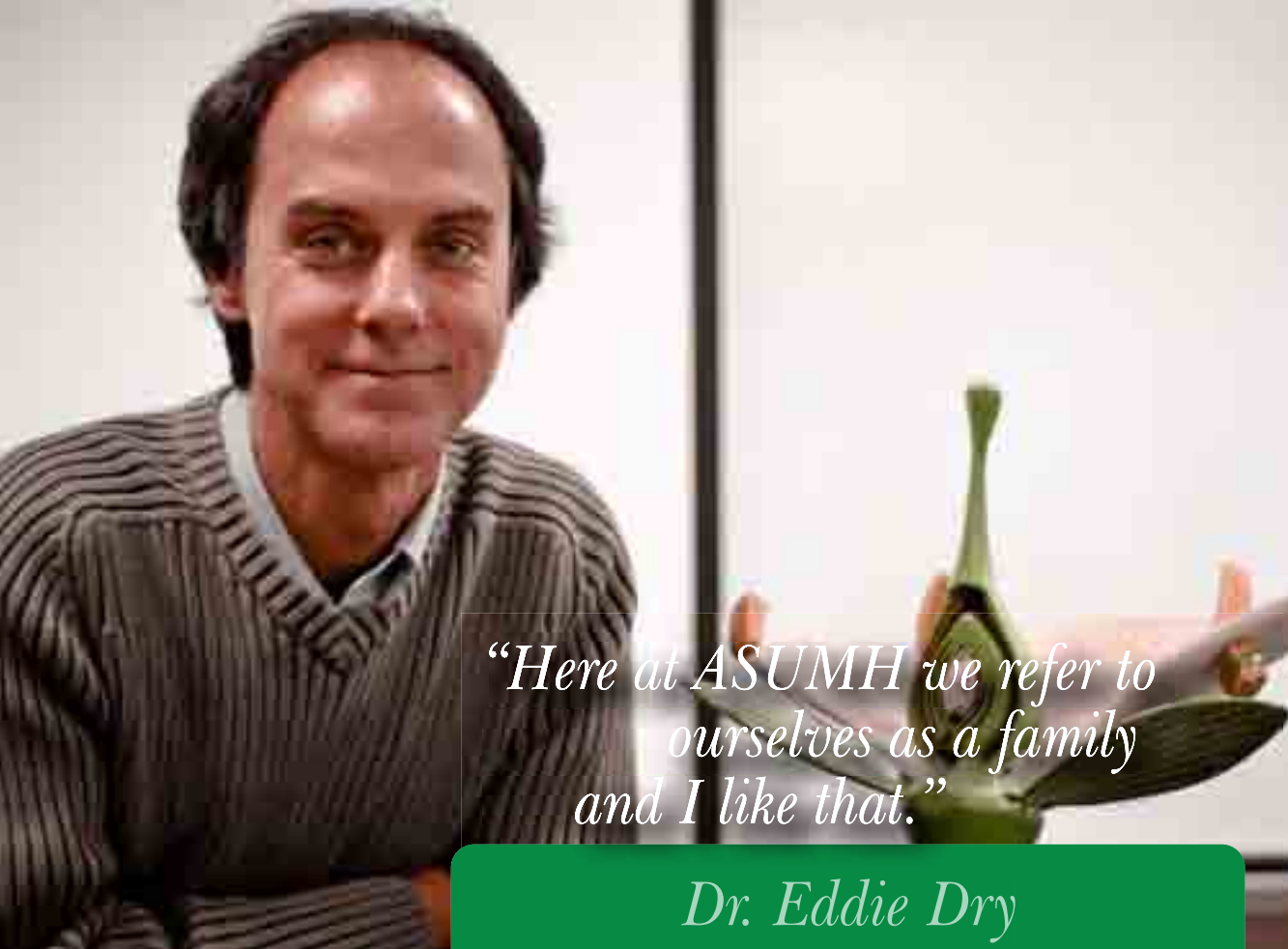
### *John & Karen Montgomery*

A love of education and the arts, and a marriage of the two, has brought the Montgomery family to ASUMH in a variety of ways. Back in 1999, John Montgomery achieved one of his goals in life by obtaining a college degree from ASUMH. About that same time, Karen Montgomery began a relationship with the college as she joined the ASUMH Development Council. Karen was drawn to the university's vision of developing a center where the arts would be celebrated in the Twin Lakes Area and spent the next ten years in fund-raising efforts to honor that vision. She was co-chairman of the 2009 Annual Fund, which had a focus of purchasing auditorium seating for the new Vada Sheid Community Development Center. Today, their son Michael is a concurrent student at ASUMH, earning college credit while still in high school. "God has put us in this little corner of heaven on earth, and we want to honor that gift by giving back to this community that we love," said Karen. To provide something he didn't have, John is encouraging fellow officers and staff to continue their education by offering scholarships through the Baxter County Sheriff's Foundation. "ASUMH provided something for me at a time when I needed it. They got me motivated to complete an education and I graduated with a 3.5 GPA and was the speaker at Commencement for my class. I hope to pay that forward." Karen is currently serving on the ASU Foundation Board of Directors. "I love the arts, I love education and I love what those things bring to a community. ASUMH's tag line 'Creating Opportunities-Changing Lives' isn't some catchy motto made up by an advertising agency. This university's presence will impact lives for generations to come," added Karen.

*Dr. Eddie Dry*

For Dr. Eddie Dry, teaching biology at ASUMH in the Ozarks is a dream job. He loves the confluence of plants and animals here and the biodiversity that is so unique to this area. Because of his enthusiasm for the Ozarks and his passion for teaching, Dry has been instrumental in developing several campus initiatives that bring students together to study biology beyond the classroom. An organizer of a Stream Team for Arkansas Game and Fish, Dry and his students have adopted Dodd Creek, which runs through the ASUMH campus, as a long-term project. Dry and his students currently monitor the water chemistry in the creek and patrol the area for litter. In the long-term, they hope to develop a nature trail along the creek and takes steps to control erosion and stabilize the bank.

Dry also wants to expose students to the sciences at a younger age. Since 2003, Dry and his students have been holding "Insectival" a science festival for young students in the Twin Lakes Area. "It's a great opportunity for over 1,500 students from grades one to six to visit a college campus and get excited about science," said Dry. "All kids love bugs, so it's easy to excite them about basic science that way." Dry gets his honors biology students excited by taking them on excursions, like to Bryant Creek in Missouri where Dry and his students have been conducting mark recaptures on crawdads for years. They estimate the population density of crawdads and "mostly have a good time outdoors," said Dry.

As a member of the Trout Task Force at ASUMH, Dry is also excited about the development of the Trout Nature Center on campus. "It will open doors for undergraduate students to work side by side on good research with graduate students from ASU-Jonesboro." Dry says he has two main goals for his students: 1) to get them interested and lose all fear of science and 2) to help them be more confident about their academic abilities. "Here at ASUMH we refer to ourselves as a family and I like that. We create a net and the students are in that net. We really want students to succeed academically and in their careers," said Dry. After 13 years at ASUMH, Dry says he still looks forward to coming to work every day and he hopes to help students find that passion in their lives too.

A seminar at a local manufacturing plant designed to offer displaced workers a chance to attend college led George Poland to ASUMH. The South Carolina native, who vacationed in the Twin Lakes Area over a decade ago and then decided to move here, grew up outdoors. When life took a turn and layoffs occurred, Poland knew he had a chance to enter college and switch to a career that would allow him more time in the woods and on the river. "As a young member of the Edisto Native American tribe back in South Carolina, I lived on the river 24 hours a day, swimming with alligators, hunting and fishing," said Poland. "I knew I didn't want to return to plant work, if I could help it." Poland took advantage of the Title III program at ASUMH and the services they offer, like peer tutoring. "I feel like the life experiences a person has and the work that they have done up to the point of entering college has a lot to do with how well they can do in class. I'll ask the questions in class that no one else will. At my age, I'm not afraid to learn." The Secrets to Success class is one thing Poland credits with helping him get his goals straight and finding his learning style. "People at ASUMH care about student success. I don't think I would have gotten the same opportunity or chance, given where I was in my life, anywhere other than at ASUMH. When I started, my goal was just to pass. Now, I have raised my grade point average over 20 points to a B+ because of the help I've gotten here." Poland has other goals in life, like having an idea patented that will help children with mobility needs. For now, he's happy to be in school and enjoy the beauty of the area he loves. "This community reminds me of how things used to be. Sometimes I sit for over an hour watching geese fly and fish breaking water. I want to enjoy the natural beauty around me with my grandchildren and I hope a career working outdoors will help me do that."

ASUMH was awarded a planning grant from the Winthrop Rockefeller Foundation in the amount of \$84,168 which will support seven counties that will work toward reducing poverty. Led by ASUMH, the consortium will create a strategic plan to help unemployed and underemployed residents in six counties in north central Arkansas.

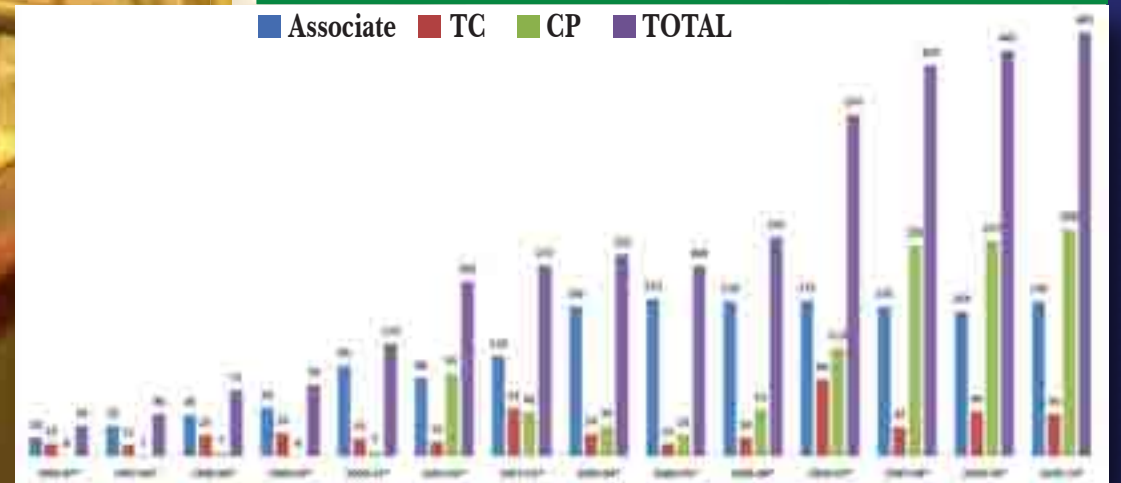
An \$822,558 grant was awarded to ASUMH by the Arkansas Natural and Cultural Resources Council (ANCRC) to fund a Trout Nature Center in the Vada Sheid Community Development Center. The center will make it possible for the area's residents and visitors to learn more about the ecology of trout and water conservation.

An avid outdoorsman who led the Arkansas Game and Fish Commission for over 20 years is now leading the charge for a new Trout Nature Center on the campus of Arkansas State University - Mountain Home. Steve Wilson serves as the Chairman of the Trout Task Force at the university and has pulled together a stellar group of leaders in the area to develop the only center in the nation, maybe even the world, dedicated solely to the study of trout. As Steve describes the mission of the Trout Nature Center, he smiles and says, "we want to teach the subject of trout with visual and/or hands-on experiences. The Trout Nature Center is modeled after Arkansas Game and Fish Nature Centers in Fort Smith, Pine Bluff, Jonesboro and Little Rock. Here, we will concentrate on the value of having trout in north central Arkansas, and how we will sustain them."

The center will go beyond fishing to include "water conservation and the ecology of trout -- a little bit for everybody," said Steve. "It will provide a glimpse of a web of life that people wouldn't be privy to who aren't fishermen." The complexion of the trout task force is multidisciplinary with the common thread of an interest in trout or the impact of trout on the area. "We've brought together educators, resort owners, professional fish biologists, engineers, artists, guides, with folks from public relations, the industry and tourism." Set to open in another twelve to sixteen months, the Trout Nature Center will be a showplace in the hometown of one of the state's leading sportsmen. And, thanks to the efforts of Steve Wilson, the rest of the world can study the species that led Steve to the Twin Lakes Area after retirement.



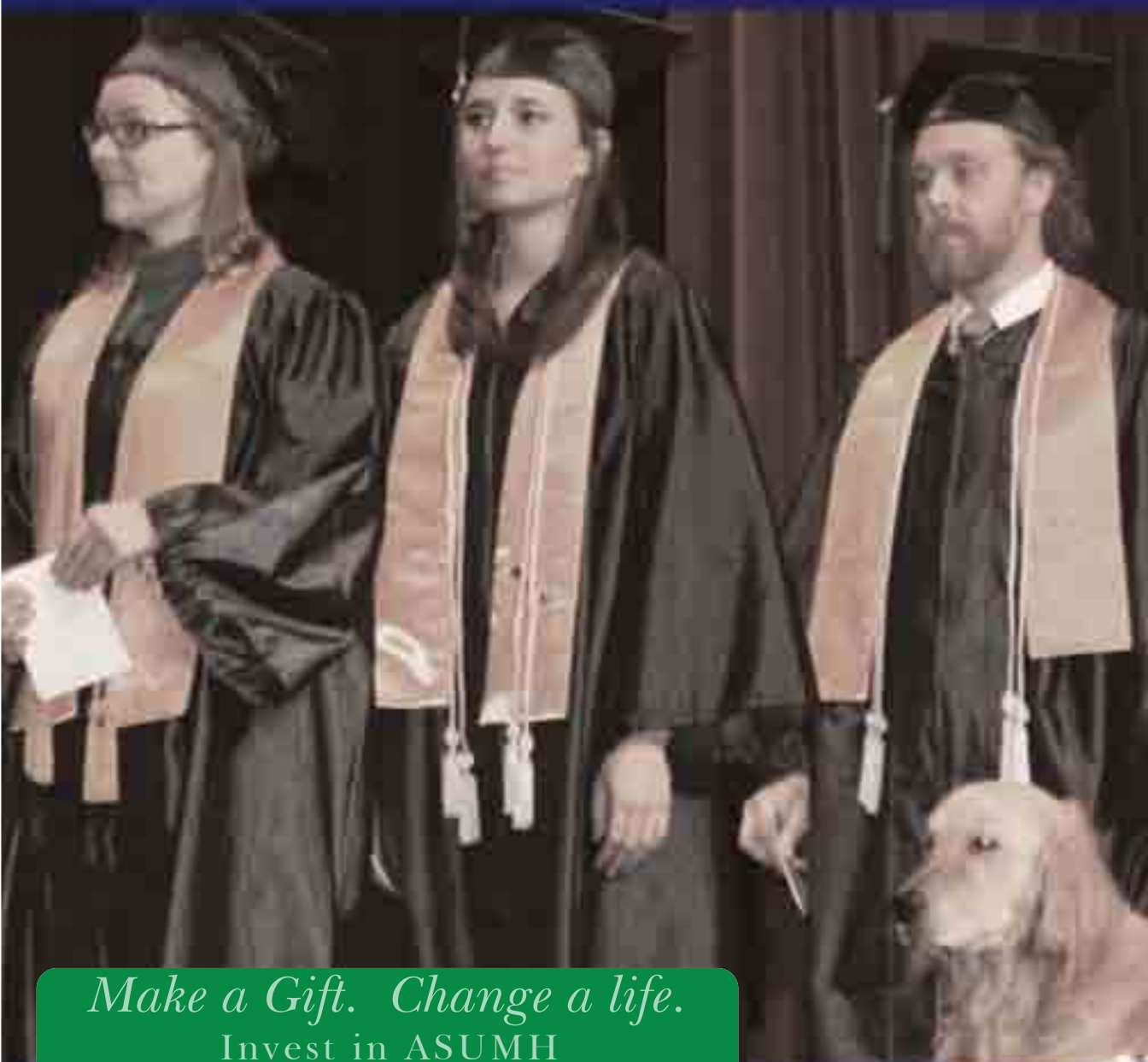
*Dr. Troylene Perry*

Dr. Perry, an instructor in accounting at ASUMH, has led several student trips through an organization she sponsors called The B.E.S.T. Experience - The Business and Economic Student Travel Experience. Through the group, Dr. Perry strives to excite students about the study of business, economics and related fields through experiential learning and travel. While on trips to Washington, New York and San Francisco, the students are drawn to corporate headquarters and production facilities. Tours of Wall Street and governmental entities excite the business students.

"I have a doctoral degree in International Business," said Dr. Perry, "and I firmly believe that you can't learn about a certain culture without being in it. Once you experience a culture, you can learn anything you need to from a book." Dr. Perry loves to see her students' faces as they experience things for the first time. "When we went to New York City with B.E.S.T. the first time, I came back with 3,000 pictures of the tops of buildings because the students were so fascinated with seeing the skyscrapers for the first time." Helping students see something for the first time excites Dr. Perry in the classroom too. "I love it when you can almost see a light bulb come on over their heads!"

Another of Dr. Perry's passions is working to develop a widow's ministry at her church. Since losing her husband nearly a year and a half ago, she has helped other widows work through their grief and pick up the pieces. When asked how she got involved in yet another project where she helps others, she said, "I guess it's because I care about people." That's not a surprise to those who know her.

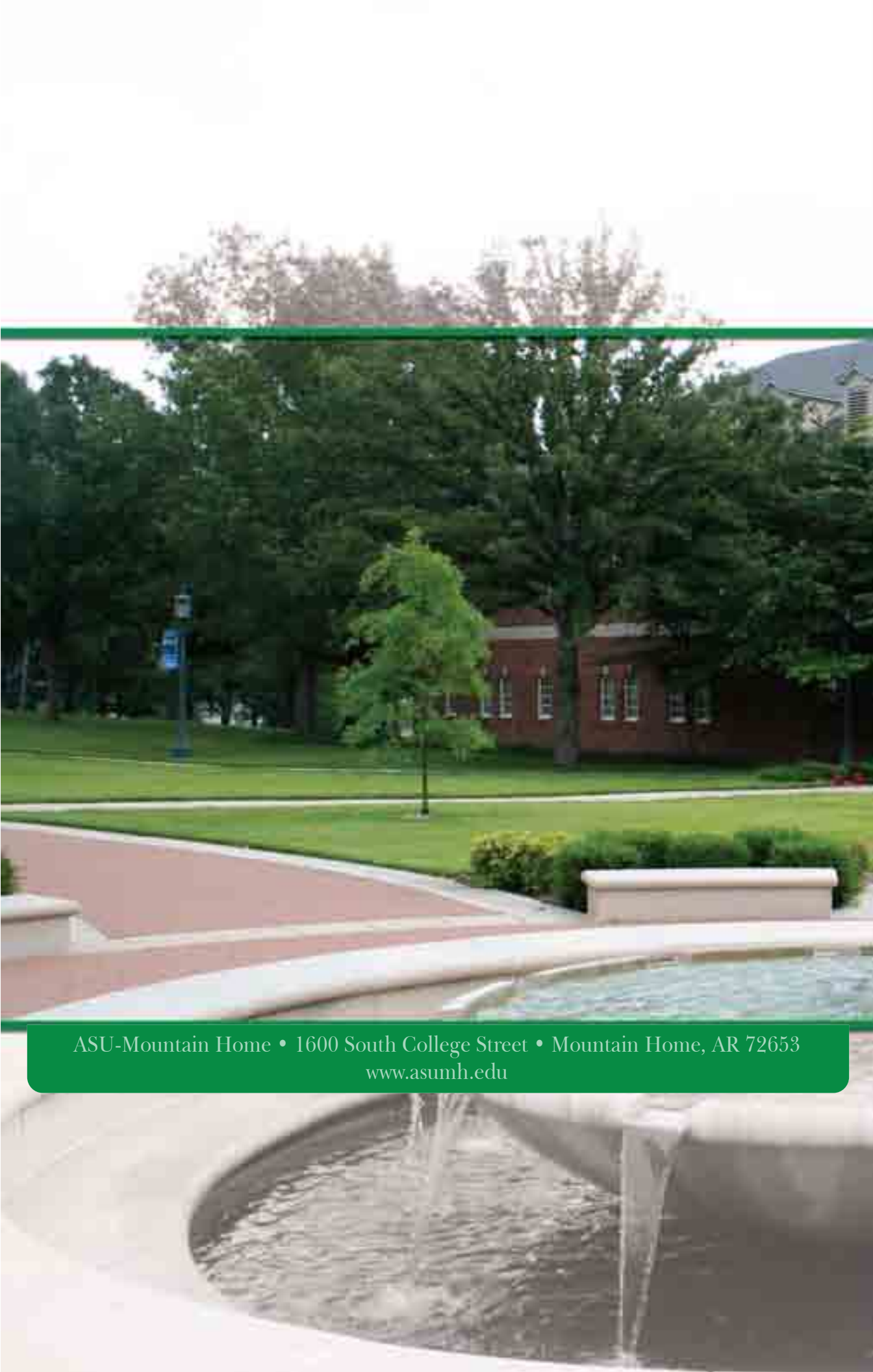
